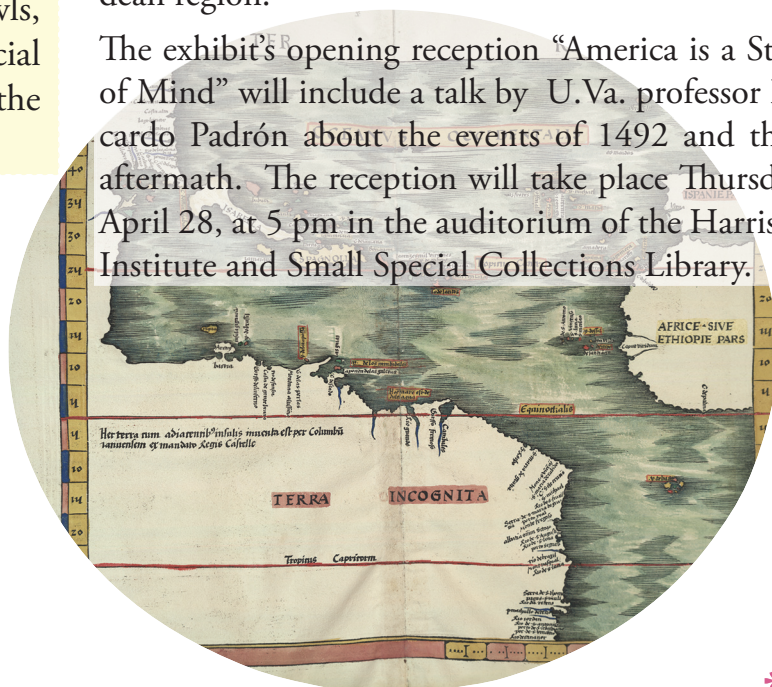
Study Break

The Harrison Institute and Small Special Collections Library has five slated for April, with everything from South America to Walt Whitman. Or for a change of scenery, stroll over to the Brown Science and Engineering Library to see faculty and student art exploring the idea of "Landscape."

South American Exhibit and Reception

Explore the history of our neighbors to the south at "South America's Gran Colombia: From Native Empires to Independent Nations," in the Small Special Collections Library. Featuring pre-Columbian artifacts, original works from the Age of Exploration, and Bolívar family items, this student-created exhibit highlights the history and culture of the Andean region.

The exhibit's opening reception "America is a State of Mind" will include a talk by U.Va. professor Ricardo Padrón about the events of 1492 and their aftermath. The reception will take place Thursday, April 28, at 5 pm in the auditorium of the Harrison Institute and Small Special Collections Library.
